Joseph Becker is an Assistant Curator of Architecture and Design at the San Francisco Museum of Modern Art, a position he has held since 2008 after assisting in the production of Your tempo: Olafur Eliasson (2007). He has moderated and served on numerous design panels, including the recent Liminal Design conference at the Harvard Graduate School of Design (2012), as well as the international TYPO Design Conference, the San Francisco Arts Commission, and the Headlands Center for the Arts. Becker has been an invited juror at Princeton University, UC Berkeley, and the California College of the Arts and has led workshops on exhibition and experiential design. He received his Bachelor of Architecture (B.Arch.) from the California College of the Arts in 2007 and co-founded OFFICEvsOFFICE, a multidisciplinary design and consulting firm in 2006.

Lex Kosieradzki is a performer, sculptor, and occasionally a musician. He facilitates artist-led group encounters. His work has been shown in Vermont, San Francisco, and Amsterdam.

Irinia Contreras (1977) is an interdisciplinary artist and writer, whose individual and collaborative projects examine personal reflections of collective experiences.
